

Ohio Family & Children First

OFCF is statutorily defined as the Governor's Cabinet for children and families that was established in 1993 by Section 121.37 of the Ohio Revised Code. The OFCF cabinet council is comprised of eleven state agencies. On a local level, the county commissioners regulate the 88 county Family & Children First Councils.

Preble County Programs

Help Me Grow A voluntary family support program for pregnant women and new parents. An evidence-based program that promotes healthy growth and development for babies and young children.

Mental Health First Aid USA (adult & youth)

An 8 hour course that teaches non-clinical participants how to identify, understand and respond to mental illnesses & substance abuse disorders. The training teaches a five step plan to provide initial support to someone who may be experiencing a crisis.

***The Parent Project** A 10 week parenting class for caregivers raising difficult or out-of-control teens. The program is designed to empower parents to reduce, reverse and change destructive adolescent behavior. It is the largest court mandated juvenile diversion program in the country. In Preble, this class is taught in conjunction with WhyTry. Families are referred through Juvenile Court, TASC, SAFE, Success program, Schools or Self.

***WhyTry** A resilience education curriculum for teens that provides simple hands-on solutions for drop out prevention, violence prevention, truancy reduction, motivation and increased academic success.

***P.A.U.S.E** A parents night out for families who have children with special needs. The child is paired with a buddy whose main goal will be to spend time having fun and caring for them.

***DD Parent Program** Teaching sessions designed to build relationships with parents using applied behavior analysis and the "Play" project in relation to their child. Sessions are conducted in the home and out of the home.

Community Wraparound A program for families that need assistance in navigation through multiple service providers to meet the needs of their child/children. It helps the family build a team of supports to assist them with their individual needs.

Strengthening Families This is a 7 session course that will teach youth, aged 10—16, and their parents/caregivers how to effectively and appropriately communicate with each other. Youth learn to handle stress and peer pressure and parents learn to set limits and show support. *Parent Project & WhyTry have replaced this program for FY17.*

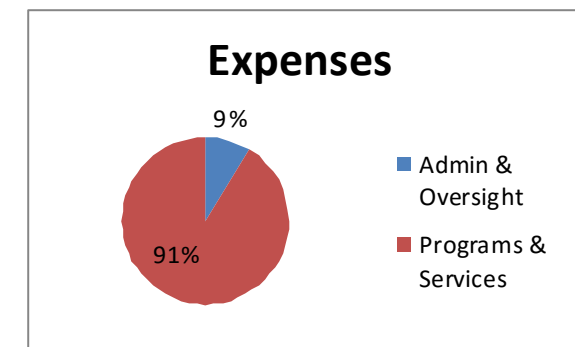
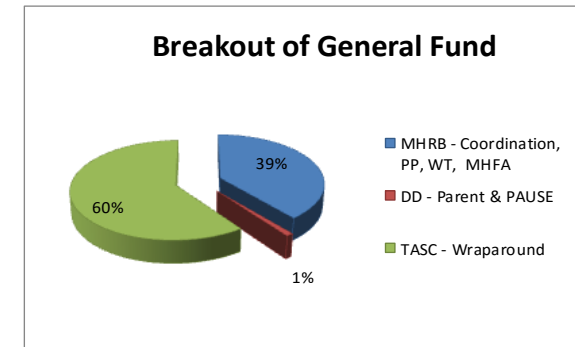
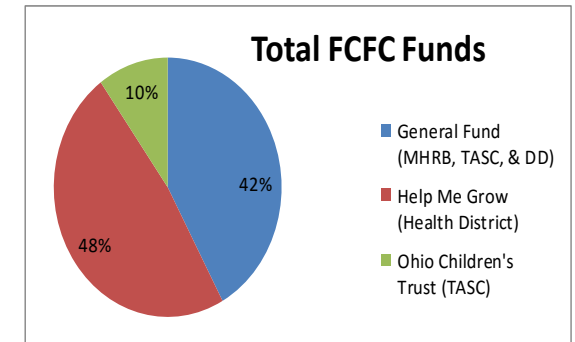
